



# FEDERATION BELLS JOHN SEAL

JOHN SEAL, percussion, has a professional career that includes 13 years in the Melbourne Symphony, Musical Director of the Australian Percussion Ensemble and extensive theatre work in professional productions of Phantom of the Opera, Les Miserables and the Australi-

an Opera and Australian Ballet.

John Seal will use a Classical Canon as the basis of the workshop. He will divide the performers into three groups around the venue so that the bell sound encompasses everyone as the canon is passed from one group to another. It will start simply and gradually increase in intensity as the piece proceeds to a final cadence. Participants will include students and others interested in experiencing the unique sonority of the Federation Bells.

The Federation Bells were commissioned especially for Australia's Federation Centenary and have been made to have pure bell tones with consistent and accurate overtones. This was made possible by using modern computer modelling of each vibration. Australian Bell set out to better understand the relationships between physical shapes and the sounds they emit and their use of technology represented a major advance in the manufacture of bells world wide. The design was made possible by the use of Finite Element Analysis software.

## **CALEDONIAN SONATAS**

#### **EVERGREN QUARTET**

Founded in Australia by the violinist, Shane Lestideau, the Evergreen Ensemble offers a program of works which gives a very complete view to music-making in the baroque period; not only focusing on the sacred and court music of the era, but also looking at what was being played in manor houses, public houses, and even out in country farmhouses as well. Works of composers such as Bach, Vivaldi, Handel and Purcell brush shoulders with 18thC traditional dance music, European modal music and memorable moments

**SCOTTISH BAROQUE** 

born of passionate improvisation!

It may come as something of a surprise, but Scotland has it's own baroque music repertoire. Littleknown outside of Scotland even during the 18thC, Scottish musicians were keenly interested in learning art of performance the and composition from their contemporaries in England, Italy, Germany and France. The resulting style, rather than being a great mishmash of European art music, differs greatly from one composer to the next depending on where, and with whom, he chose to study. It could be said that one of the only unifying features of this repertoire is therefore the influence of Scotland's own traditional music. The singing, piping and fiddling tradition was strong throughout the country during this period, and though some were quick to criticise the traditional tunes as being 'base', it's useful to remember that these same tunes would also have been used in Country Dance Balls for the likes of the royal family. More than anywhere else in Europe, Scottish baroque music sat delicately balanced between Art music and Traditional music practices. Early Music lovers will have no difficulty in spotting the swung quavers, the drone imitations or the crunchy ornaments, and a Trad fiddler will

immediately feel the longer and interwoven phrasing, the full harmonisations and the virtuosic passages. It was not an easy feat for these composers to find a musical common ground between the traditionally unaccompanied modal melodies on one hand, and fully-harmonised melodies arranged for chamber ensemble

on the other. You can be the judge as to whether there are some names amongst those you will hear today who rose to the challenge more successfully than others!

George Emmerson, in his book entitled 'Rantin' Pipe and Tremblin' String', says on the subject of modality,

... "to the Gael, and to those who through familiarity with Scottish songs have acquired an ear for the bittersweet quality of the original modes, such arrangements are just as velvet compared with peatsmelling tweed".

Amongst all of the continental countries to influence the baroque movement in Scotland, Italy featured most prominently. Corelli was known and greatly respected by all educated musicians of the time. Geminiani's "Art of Playing the Violin" was the most influential musical publication of the era. Not only did several Scottish musicians make the long voyage south to study with the great Italian masters (McGibbon is said to have done so for example), a handful of Italians also migrated to Scotland, bringing with them a wealth of new repertoire and experience. Barsanti was one such composer. After marrying a scotswoman

in Edinburgh, he became a great admirer of Scottish traditional music and continued to practise and arrange scots tunes alongside his overtures, sonatas and concertos. James Oswald, one of the most successful and prolific composers of 18thC Scotland, also chose to use the italian pseudonym David Rizzio as a way of giving more credibility to his baroque publications.

#### Mt Zion Chapel before it became Chapel on Little Ryrie...

Pastor John Bunyan McCure arrived in Melbourne from England in December 1852 and soon after made his home Geelong. He commenced services in 1853 in a rented room in Chilwell,

where before long the congregation outgrew the accommodation.

The congregation moved to Geelong, firstly to an old store in Yarra street, then later to the Old Independent Chapel in Myers Street. It

was here that the church was officially formed on the 26th November 1856. Land was purchased in Little Ryrie Street, three doors east of Fenwick Street in 1856, and Mt Zion chapel was built,

opening on 1st November 1857. The exterior of the church was stuccoed and decorated in 1876. According to heritage Victoria, the Church is the oldest known

extant church of the Particular Baptist Church in Victoria.

After 10 years of being unused a proposal to convert the site into a cafe was granted in 2011 and in early 2012 construction was underway. Structurally compromised walls were

underpinned and reassured opening up the chapel with stunning natural light. Today the Chapel on Little Ryrie is again full of life serving hard working patrons and workers in the area as a cafe and function venue striving to be the best part of your day!

Further organ studies were undertaken in Italy at the Accademia di Musica Italiana in 1979 in Pistoria with Professor Luigi Tagliavini in Baroque Performing Practices.

In 1990 Mr Levy was appointed Senior Lecturer in Trumpet at the Queensland Conservatorium in Brisbane where he resided until joining the TSO in 1998. He has appeared as principal trumpet with the New Zealand Symphony and the Sydney Symphony and as soloist with the Australian Chamber Orchestra and the Tasmanian Symphony Orchestra. His CD of twentieth century trumpet and organ music on the Australian 'Move' label has won great acclaim.

Mr Levy's tenure at the Queensland conservatorium, as Lecturer in trumpet, conductor of the brass ensemble and later as Head of Brass has contributed to the development of exceptional trumpet players and brass instrumentalists currently employed in symphony orchestras in Australia, New Zealand and Europe.

In 2010, Mr Levy was appointed as Brass Coordinator and trumpet lecturer at the Tasmanian Conservatorium of Music. He is president of the Island Brass Academy in Hobart, a Tasmanian organization formed in 2005, dedicated to educating young brass players and bringing national and international artists to perform in Tasmania.




BRENDON LUKIN studied the organ with David Rumsey (Basel), and Kimberley Marshall (USA) at the Sydney Conservatorium of Music graduating as "Student of the Year". Further studies were also conducted with Phillip Swanton, Marie Clair Alain (France), Gillian Weir (UK) and Professor Michael Rudulescue (Vienna).

Brendon has held organ positions in Sydney, Chicago and Sweden and has performed as a soloist with organizations such as The Chicago Symphony Chorus (in the reopening of Symphony Hall), Sydney Symphony Orchestra, Sydney Philharmonia Choir, the Singapore Symphony Orchestra, the Malaysian Philharmonic and was recently featured with soprano and wife Catherine Lukin and Synergy-Percussion to much acclaim and sold out audiences in the new Esplanade Concert Hall in Singapore.

Brendon has performed organ recitals in most of Australia's major venues including the Sydney Opera House, Sydney Town Hall (alongside Roger Woodward), and Sydney University and also throughout Asia, America and Europe. He has broadcast live and recorded for Radio ABC Classic FM "Sunday Live" (on several occasions), Radio Sweden, 2MBS and 3 MBS (Melbourne).

#### PETR EBEN Four movements for trumpet and organ after Marc Chagall

Fine art has always been a prominent source of inspiration for Petr Eben (1929 - 2007). Chagall's stained-glass windows for the synagogue in Jerusalem gave an impulse for the 4 movements for trumpet and organ, commissioned by the city gallery in the western-Bohemian town of Cheb. Eben commented on his choice of instruments "The solemness of the large panes of stained glass made me imagine the sound of the organ and the intensity and brilliance of the sheaves of bright colours called for the shrill tone of the trumpet." Eben combines the two instruments in an original manner: both parts retain a great deal of independence, progressing in their own rhythmic patterns, intersecting in places. The modal composition typical of Eben's method is confronted here with atonality, enabling the final unison of the two instruments sound with a monumental effect. Since its origin in 1976 Windows have been one of Eben's most frequently performed pieces. The individual movements of the cycle have the names of colours: The Blue Window, The Green Window, The Red Window, The Golden Window. Yoram and Brendon will perform the fourth movement of this work.

### **SURE ON THIS SHINING NIGHT**

This concert includes three works by Australian composers, two of which are premieres. The *Requiem* by Barney Ellis was first performed in the UK and today's performance is its Australian debut. George Dreyfus, one of Australia's most respected and popular composers, has specially arranged *The Song of Brother Son* so that this premiere performance can be accompanied by the Sonus Ensemble.



**HEALEY** TOM is a choral conductor, organist and singer and is musically active in Geelong and Melbourne. He was Director of Music at Geelong Grammar for many years and, most recently, Director of Music at St Andrew's Anglican Church, Brighton, where he directed the 40 voice

choir of Choral Scholars. He has directed the choir of the Geelong Summer Music Camp on many occasions and is on the board of the Geelong Advertiser Music Scholarship Trust and the committee of Music at the Basilica. He has sung and recorded with The Ensemble of the Fourteenth Century, Les Six and the Australian Chamber Choir. He has been Acting Director of Music at St David's Cathedral, Hobart, and is presently Acting Director of Music at Trinity College, Melbourne University.



BARNEY ELLIS wrote his requiem while studying composition as part of a music degree from Edinburgh university. initial movements The were composed at the University of North while Carolina on exchange in 1997. The first performance was with student choir

Edinburgh in 1998 once the work was complete. That version was also recorded as part of a disc featuring student choral compositions. It's genesis is in the English cathedral choir tradition, and influenced by the great French 19th century requiems of Faure and Duruffle. The composer was a tenor lay clerk at Edinburgh episcopal cathedral singing evensong daily, while a student, and performed both requiems several times. The requiem is in nine short movements loosely based on the circle of fifths, as the tonality changes by a fifth for each movement. The style is lyrical and harmonic, and hopefully easy to listen to. After

completing his BMus with honours Barney spent a year at the Frankfurt Hochschule studying bassoon, and also continuing to compose, especially wind chamber music. Since completing his studies Barney has continued to be an active musician, singing and playing in various pro am groups in London, Melbourne and now Geelong. This version of the requiem has been redrafted for Sonus wind ensemble to accompany Vox Angelica, using an extra horn and additional alto flute to create a deliberately low tessitura, so winds replace the organ accompaniment of the original for this premier performance in Australia.

VOX ANGELICA is a new chamber choir in Geelong. It was formed some years ago in Melbourne as an 8 voice ensemble which performed in Melbourne and Geelong. In 2016 it has been expanded to a 16 voice chamber choir made up of experienced singers from Geelong and Melbourne. The choir is directed by Tom Healey, a long time resident of Geelong who performs extensively as a conductor, organist and singer. He is former Director of Music at Geelong Grammar School and St Andrew's Brighton. He is presently Acting Director of the Choir of Trinity College, Melbourne University.

#### **REQUIEM**

The *Requiem* was first performed and recorded in Edinburgh in 1998. The composer has rearranged the original organ accompaniment for the Sonus Ensemble and Vox Angelica Chamber Choir for this concert. Based on the text of the great requiems of Faure and Durufle, it is melodic and deliberately short. The structure broadly follows the 'circle of 5ths', moving through all the keys of the scale by a 5<sup>th</sup>, one per movement.

### **EKLEKTIKOS**

The Kyrie eleison, Christi eleison and Benedictus comes from the Gregorian Mass known as the Missa de Angelis, believed to date from as early as the 9<sup>th</sup> cen. It is a liturgical chant of Western Christianity that accompanied the celebration of the Mass. In tonight's performance these early chants (sung by the cantor) will be juxtaposed with a modern interpretation of the main themes in a four part version by Claudio Dall' Albero, sung by the choir from the gallery.

Threnody for solo cello (1991/2) is one movement but in four sections: Cantando; Con Malinconia; Risoluto; Con Rassagnazione. Sculthorpe's work is based upon the main theme of his orchestral piece Kakadu; this theme being a free adaptation of an Aboriginal lament from Elcho Island, near Australia's northern coast, in the Arafura Sea. Threnody is dedicated to the memory of the conductor Stuart Challender, who died of AIDS in December 1991.

Arvo Pärt, the Estonian composer is an extraordinarily reclusive yet successful musician. 'Spiegel im Spiegel' (Mirror in the Mirror) is in the 'Tinntinabular' style – a term coined by Pärt himself to describe his minimalist meditative style of composition. This work is enduringly popular for the calm, still environment it provokes, in a world that is so often much more noisey and frantic!

Improvisation on Benedictus – saxophone. An interplay between the choir and the haunting sounds of the saxophone as the music moves around the basilica, expressing the ancient chant in a modern and changing interpretation.

'Benedictus' is the 12th movement from The Armed Man: A Mass for Peace. It was commissioned by the Royal Armouries to mark the transition from one millennium to another and reflects on the passing of 'the most war-torn and destructive century in human history' and looks forward in hope to a more peaceful future. The Armed Man is dedicated to the victims of the Kosovo conflict, whose tragedy was unfolding as it was

being composed. For tonight's performance, the Benedictus has been set for organ, cello, violin and oboe by Frank De Rosso.

Penderecki's "Per Slava for solo violoncello" (For Slava) was written for the virtuoso cellist Mstislav Rostropovich whose friends call him Slava. It is notated without barlines encouraging the performer to shape the flow of the given material. Lovely, sighing tones open the work and develop an elegiac character. The interval structure is built around the half-steps in the name BACH, which in German nomenclature stands for the notes B-flat, A, C, B-natural. When double stops enter, there is a wonderful illusion that two instruments are playing because of the closeness of the intervals.

The "Coronation" Mass KV 317 was performed during Mozart's time in Salzburg. The autograph manuscript is dated 23 March 1779, so the work was clearly intended for use on Easter Sunday 4 April 1779, when the archbishop himself celebrated the mass. (This was not the occasion from which the C-major Mass gets its nickname; the origin of the title was most likely the coronation of Emperor Francis I of Austria a few months after Mozart's death, because a set of copyist's parts for KV 317 bears the title "Mass in C for the Coronation Celebration of His Majesty Francis I as Emperor of Austria.")

In tonight's performance, we include the single movement Sonata in C KV 278. This sonata is one of 17 that Mozart wrote to be played during Mass between the Epistle and Gospel. They are sometimes referred to as the Epistle sonatas.

On June 17 of 1791, his last year, Mozart took a break to compose the profound and heavenly Ave Verum Corpus for chorus and strings. It is a setting of a 14 cent. Latin Eucharistic hymn and was written about 6 months before Mozart's death. This beautiful work foreshadows musical aspects of the sublime Requiem and gives us a picture of an otherworldly peace unlike almost no other work.

MIRANDA BROCKMAN has been a permanent cellist with the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra since 1999. She completed a Masters Degree in Music Performance at Melbourne University studying under Nelson Cooke. Her earlier teachers were Christian Wojtowicz, Marianne Hunt and Kate Finnis. She has

He is a member of Melbourne-based Arcko Symphonic Ensemble, which commissions and premieres new works and maintains a repertoire of modern works, nourishing Philip's interest in contemporary art music. In 2015, Philip performed Australian F.S. Kelly's recently discovered Gallipoli Sonata (1915) at venues in Melbourne and Geelong. He has toured China with the Australian Concert Orchestra, has toured with the Australian Philharmonic Orchestra, and was delighted to join the newly minted Geelong Symphony Orchestra in their opening concert.



SHANNON EBELING received his Master of Music (Performance) in 2011 from the University of Melbourne after graduating with first class honours in the Bachelor of Music and Bachelor of Teaching degrees in 2007. He was awarded the ASME Tertiary Music Student award for outstanding achievement in Music

Education Studied in 2006. 


